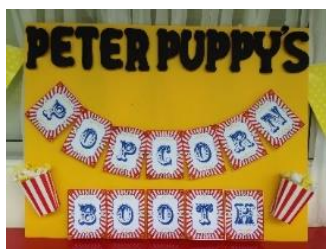


Want a theme for your Letterland Day? Creating a theme provides a great opportunity to turn your day into a cross-curricular activity. We've gathered up some inspiration and ideas – tried and tested by other schools, teachers and parents!

Letterland Circus/Carnival – Use a circus/carnival theme across all the stations e.g. Peter Puppy's Popcorn Booth or Harry Hat Man's Hotdog Booth.



Letterland Animal Day – Involve local animal shelters or farms so that children get to meet lots of different animals and learn about how to look after them properly. One school even had Peter Puppy's Adaption Station, where a local puppy shelter brought puppies, and families could take them home for \$10!



Letterland Science Fair – Have different stations with science-based activities e.g. Vicky Violet's Volcanoes, Bouncy Ben's Bugs or Clever Cat's Catapult (who can throw marshmallows the furthest).



Letterland Olympics – Who doesn't love a competition? Have each stand act as an event for the Letterland Olympics e.g. Red Robot's Ring Toss or Kicking King's Kick Ups.



Letterland Detective – Set up Letterland-related mysteries that the children must solve e.g. 'Who Stole Harry Hat Man's hat?'. The mystery can only be solved once children have met all the different Letterlanders and got a clue from each one.



Letterland Adventureland – Have your Letterland Day split into different sections, e.g. Jumping Jim, Zig Zag Zebra and Eddy Elephant may all be in the Letterland Jungle.

Letterland Treasure Hunters – Have your little learners follow a trail (meeting Letterlanders along the way) and hunting for treasure.



Letterland Town – Have different areas of a 'town' e.g. the post office, or the town hall. This can include elections for the town mayor (providing an opportunity to teach children about the importance of voting) or teaches children about different occupations (maybe Noisy Nick tells the children about nurses because he regularly falls of his bike).
